



Dear Sea Turtle Supporter,

Sea turtles are majestic ocean animals and iconic symbols of the sea. The lineage of sea turtles is ancient, dating from the time of dinosaurs. Yet, despite their worldwide popularity, sea turtles face unprecedented threats to their survival, ranging from habitat destruction and incidental capture in fishing gear to pollutants and climate change. For such wide-ranging migratory animals, effective conservation can only be achieved through cooperative global efforts to protect all life stages across large oceanic regions spanning multiple countries.

The International Sea Turtle Society (ISTS) was formed 41 years ago to promote the conservation of sea turtles. Each year the Society hosts the International Sea Turtle Symposium - a meeting that brings together the world's foremost experts in sea turtle science and conservation to facilitate an annual worldwide exchange of information, and throughout the years has developed a unique culture and strong traditions. The symposium draws almost a thousand participants from all over the world and embraces a wide range of disciplines ranging from science and veterinary medicine to education, public policy, and grassroots conservation efforts.

The 2024 symposium will be held March 24 - 29 in Pattaya, Thailand at the Dusit Thani Hotel (https://www.dusit.com/dusitthani-pattaya/). The theme of this year's symposium is "All In - All Together; Inspiring The Next Generations of Global Sea Turtle Conservationists". The symposium will begin with two days of workshops and regional meetings on specialized topics in sea turtle biology and conservation. The four primary days of the symposium follow and include oral and poster presentations describing original research and conservation efforts. Several social events are also scheduled to foster connections among participants, including a welcome social, a student mixer, a Thai cultural night, and a farewell banquet.

The 42nd International Sea Turtle Symposium would not be possible without the support of generous donors like you, who play a key role in helping us cultivate environmental stewardship around the globe. *Leatherback (Dermochelys coriacea): US\$20,000 and above

In partnership with the Sponsor, we direct Leatherback-level donations to support workshops, special sessions, plenary speakers, social events, and symposium-wide coffee breaks.

Leatherbacks are the largest turtle in the world and are the only species of sea turtle that lack scales and a hard shell.

*Loggerhead (Caretta caretta): US\$15,000 to \$19,999

The loggerhead turtle is named for its large head, which supports powerful jaw muscles that enable them to feed on hard-shelled invertebrate prey.









*Hawksbill (Eretmochelys imbricata): US\$10,000 to US\$14,999

In partnership with the Sponsor, we direct Hawksbill level donations to support workshops, special sessions, audiovisual equipment, plenary speakers, social events and symposium-wide coffee breaks.

Hawksbill turtles get their name from their unique beak-like bill, resembling that of a hawk - useful in consuming their main prey of reef sponges.

*Green (Chelonia mydas): US\$5,000 to US\$9,999

In partnership with the Sponsor, we direct Green level donations to support workshops, special sessions, audiovisual equipment rental and social events. This level of support may also go to supporting printing costs and ground transportation.

The green sea turtle is the largest hard-shelled sea turtle and is herbivorous, eating mostly seagrasses and algae.

*Kemp's Ridley (Lepidochelys kempii): US\$1000 to US\$4,999

Kemp's Ridley level donations are used to support workshops, special sessions, program printing, audiovisual rental, cost of student travel, and travel of participants from developing countries. Sponsors have the option to designate the gift for use as travel funds and specify a particular group to support (e.g., students from Central America or participants from Africa).

Kemp's Ridley are found mostly in the Gulf of Mexico and are the smallest species of sea turtle in the world.

*Olive Ridley (Lepidochelys olivacea): US\$500 to US\$999

Olive Ridley level donations help defray the cost of workshops, printing, student awards, student travel, and travel of participants from developing countries.

Olive Ridley turtles get their name from the olive-green color of their shell. This species is among the smallest of marine species and are found primarily in tropical oceans.

*Flatback (Natator depressus): US\$25 to US\$499

Flatback level donations are used to help defray the cost of workshops, printing, student awards, student travel, and travel of participants from developing countries.

Flatbacks are known to occur only in the waters around Australia. They get their name from the relatively flattened curvature of their shell.
